



God's End-Time Army (?)



- Jehovah's Witnesses! No-psych!
 - If they take the *number* literally, they need to be consistent
 - they should be male Jewish virgins





- But when J.W.'s started they were <u>partly</u> right: this is the <u>number of the "saved":</u>
 - 7:3: "a seal on the foreheads of the servants of our God"
 - the "servants of God" in Revelation are all believers (1:1; 2:20; 6:11; 19:10; 22:3, 6, 9)
 - I won't ask how many of you are male Jewish virgins






The end-time army of God's elect?





- Some Jewish people expected a great end-time army that would go slaughter the Gentiles for God
- Why Jewish male virgins?
 - Israelite armies were male
 - in holy war, warriors abstained from intercourse before battle
 - The only other time that John hears a number, it's the number of troops (Rev 9:16)
- Are you looking forward to slaughtering the Gentiles?




Military census

- 1. Males (14:4)
- 2. Celibate (in holy war) (purity, devotion to the LORD)
- 3. Equal # from each tribe (Num 31:4-6; 1 Chr 27:1-15)
- 4. Battalions of 1000 fairly standard (1 Macc 3:55)
- 5. End-time holy war (1QM)



But Revelation may reapply this traditional Jewish end-time image--as a symbol.

- ▶ 1. Elsewhere in Revelation believers are spiritually Jewish
 - the messianic communities are viewed as lampstands (1:20)--a Jewish symbol for Jewish people
 - Believers in Yeshua are viewed as true Jews (2:9; 3:9)
- **2.** This fits the pervasive symbolism of Revelation
- 3. Dan & Ephraim are left out (but cf. Ezek 48:1)






This parallels the reapplication of the image in 5:5-6:

- John *hears* of a conquering lion (5:5)
- when he turns, he *sees* a lamb (5:6)

Jesus thus conquers through martyrdom

- John *hears* of an endtime army (7:1-8)
- He *sees* an army of martyrs (7:9-17)

Jesus' followers thus conquer through martyrdom (6:9-11)





- 12 squared x 10 cubed: God's people arranged according to military ranks (thousands)
- More clearly: Yohanan explicitly reuses these symbolic numbers
- 21:16: New Jerusalem like a square (Israel's army camps)
- <u>12,000</u> stadia long, wide, and high: *1500 miles*
- wall: only 144 cubits (disproportional if literal)
- the point: the city of God for the people of God, New Jerusalem for those spiritually Jewish



Sealing of righteous

- Proposed backgrounds
 - Branding soldiers (some): end-time army
 - branding animals, slaves: God's "servants"
 - head and hand: phylacteries; vs. Rev 13:16-17
 - seal attests ownership (Is 55:5)
- Righteous branded for salvation: Ezek 9:1-7



Who is in 7:9-17?

- Innumerable multitude in 7:9:
 - Echoes promise of Abraham's descendants (Gen 13:16)?
- The great tribulation in 7:14
 - May echo Dan 12:1, echoed in 1 Macc 9:27
 - Both involve God's people Israel



They will neither hunger nor thirst, nor will the desert heat nor sun beat upon them. He who has compassion on them will guide them and lead them beside springs of water--Isa 49:10

Never again will they hunger; never again will they thirst. The sun will not beat upon them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd. He will lead them to springs of living water. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes--Rev 7:16-17



In Is 49:10, God will

- 1. Protect His people from
 - a. Hunger
 - b. Thirst
 - c. The sun
- 2. Lead them to springs of water

In Rev 7:16, Yeshua will

- 1. Protect His people from
 - a. Hunger
 - b. Thirst
 - c. The sun
- 2. Lead them to springs of water



Rev 7:17 evokes Is 25:8


In Is 25:8

His people's tears






Two differences in Revelation



- 1. Jesus is identified with YHWH
- 2. The promise for Israel's restoration now welcomes all believers from all peoples who follow the lamb.



Lambs were weakest members of a flock (Is 40:11)



But Jesus is our shepherd precisely because he is the slaughtered lamb.
