

Who are the "144,000"?

- Jehovah's Witnesses! No-psych!
 - If they take the *number* literally, they need to be consistent
 - they should be male Jewish virgins





- But when J.W.'s started they were <u>partly</u> right: this is the number of the "saved":
 - 7:3: "a seal on the foreheads of the servants of our God"
 - the "servants of God" in Revelation are all believers (1:1; 2:20; 6:11; 19:10; 22:3, 6, 9)
 - I won't ask how many of you are male Jewish virgins

Rev 14:1: 144,000 standing on Mount Zion

- New Jerusalemites—those who will dwell in the New Jerusalem
- 14:4: chaste—male version of pure New Jerusalem adorned for her husband

This parallels the reapplication of the image in 5:5-6:

John *hears* of a conquering lion (5:5)

when he turns, he *sees* a lamb (5:6)

Jesus thus conquers through martyrdom John *hears* of an endtime army (7:1-8)

He *sees* an army of martyrs (7:9-17)

Jesus' followers thus conquer through martyrdom (6:9-11)

This number symbolizes the people of God

- 12 squared x 10 cubed: God's people arranged according to military ranks (thousands)
- More clearly: Yohanan explicitly reuses these symbolic numbers
- <u>21:16</u>: New Jerusalem like a square (Israel' s army camps)
- <u>12,000</u> stadia long, wide, and high: *1500 miles*
- wall: only <u>144</u> *cubits* (disproportional if literal)
- the point: the city of God for the people of God, New Jerusalem for those spiritually Jewish

Sealing of righteous

Proposed backgrounds

- Branding soldiers (some): end-time army
- branding animals, slaves: God's "servants"
- head and hand: phylacteries; vs. Rev 13:16-17
- seal attests ownership (Is 55:5)
- Righteous branded for salvation: Ezek 9:1-7

Who is in 7:9-17?

Innumerable multitude in 7:9:

- Echoes promise of Abraham's descendants (Gen 13:16)?
- The great tribulation in 7:14
 - May echo Dan 12:1, echoed in 1 Macc 9:27
 - Both involve God's people Israel



NT parallels OT

They will neither hunger nor thirst, nor will the desert heat nor sun beat upon them. He who has compassion on them will guide them and lead them beside springs of water--Isa 49:10

Never again will they hunger; never again will they thirst. The sun will not beat upon them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd. He will lead them to springs of living water. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes--Rev 7:16-17

v 7:16 evokes Is 49:10

In Is 49:10, God will

- 1. Protect His people from
 - a. Hunger
 - b. Thirst
 - c. The sun
- 2. Lead them to springs of water

In Rev 7:16, Yeshua will

- 1. Protect His people from
 - a. Hunger
 - b. Thirst
 - c. The sun
- 2. Lead them to springs of water

Rev 7:17 evokes Is 25:8

In Is 25:8

God will wipe away
 His people's tears

In Rev 7:17
Jesus will wipe away His people's tears



Two differences in Revelation



- 1. Jesus is identified with YHWH
- 2. The promise for Israel's restoration now welcomes all believers from all peoples who follow the lamb.

Lambs were weakest members of a flock (Is 40:11)



But Jesus is our shepherd precisely because he is the slaughtered lamb.

Power of prayer (8:2-6)

7 angels (= 7 archangels?)

trumpets: worship instruments in heavenly temple--but also call to war

Incense: prayers of saints (8:3)

• Ps 141:2: May my prayer before you be like incense, my hand-lifting like the evening sacrifice in the Temple.

judgments cry out for vindication (6:9-11)

The prayers of the suffering saints move history!



- As in Daniel 9-10, kings are merely pawns in God's plans
- Not always immediate, but God's answer comes
- E.g., cries of slaves in
 U.S.; or those oppressed under apartheid or Soviet Empire

The trumpets and bowls evoke the judgments on Egypt

- <u>Revelation's trumpets and</u> <u>bowls</u>
- Water turned to blood or wormwood
- Darkness
- Fiery hail
- Locust army
- (frogs from mouth)
 - deliverance by blood of Passover Lamb

- Water turned to blood

- fiery hail
- locusts
- frogs
